As the dog days of summer approach people will be spending more time boating on our beautiful local lakes. Please take a few minutes to review some important safety tips the Belmont Fire Department would like you all to keep in mind so that we can all have a pleasant summer.



1. Remember to always wear your life jacket and designate a sober skipper!

2. Know fuel tank capacity: To prevent overfilling, boaters should know their vessel's precise fuel capacity. This basic information is critical to a safe fill-up

3. Boating in an unfamiliar area, whether on a fishing trip or vacation is much safer and more pleasurable if you can take advantage of dependable, local knowledge.



4. A personal watercraft is a powerboat, not a toy. If you operate one, you are the captain with all the same responsibilities for knowing and obeying boating regulations.



5. Know your abilities and those of your paddling partners and don't get in over your head

Safety Tips

from Your Building Inspector

Don't Let Electrical Cords Create a Danger in Your House!

Overloaded outlets and undersized electrical extension cords can cause a fire or electrocution danger.

Use Electrical Cords Safely:

- Never overload electrical cords or power strips. Electrical cords and power strips have a designated load capacity. Be sure the total amount of energy used by appliances and lights plugged into the strip does not exceed that capacity.
- Use only listed power strips that have integral overload protection and have been tested by a product safety laboratory.
- Don't use appliances that have damaged cords.
- Extension cords should not be used as a substitute for permanently wired outlets.

Electrical cords must be the proper wire size for the load they serve. Overloaded cords will become hot and can start a fire. Avoid permanent use of extension cords. Appliance cords and extension cords are susceptible to physical damage from foot traffic, furniture, house pets, swinging doors and many other causes so protect them from damage. Contact your local building safety department for more information.

Happenings from the Highway Department

Progress on the Church Hill/ Monument Square project is on schedule. The drainage portion of the job is all but finished and roadway reconstruction will be next. The monument will be realigned and sidewalks brought to the high school. We hope for a late August completion. Please avoid the area whenever possible during working hours and expect delays.

Other work planned in town is a drainage reconstruction on Old State Rd. Existing drainage is in very poor condition and in desperate need of replacement.

We are in the process of roadside mowing this may take up to two weeks to complete.

We have added 12 new parking spaces, four at the library; four on Mill Street next to the Library and four at the Mill. Hopefully this will help clear up any parking congestion downtown.



Monthly Report

The Board of Selectmen will hold a Public Hearing to amend the quarterly sewer rate on Monday, August 15, 2011 beginning at 5:00 p.m. Please watch our website at www.belmontnh.org for notice of the hearing and further information on the proposed rate.

Road reconstruction and construction of new sidewalks continues on Church Street and Monument Square. It is anticipated that the work will be complete by early September. Please be aware of possible road closures and detours during construction. Anyone with questions can contact the Town Administrator's office at 267-8300 or the Public Works Department at 528-2677.

The Town of Belmont in conjunction with McGlaflin Group Auctioneers of Plymouth held an auction of Town Owned Property on Saturday, July 23, 2011. The auction was successful and we have returned 14 properties to the tax rolls.

Police Department

Since the first part of June, the Town of Belmont, as well as some surrounding areas, has been targeted and we have suffered burglaries, thefts of vehicles as well as thefts from vehicles. Many of these crimes are crimes of opportunity and can be prevented.

While we have been working with other agencies, we need our residents to take some precautions to make things more difficult.

1. **Be aware of your surroundings** - Don't give thieves a chance to make you and your neighborhood a victim. Watch over your neighbors and report suspicious people, cars and activity to the Belmont Police Department as soon as possible. No one knows your neighborhood better than you!
2. **Take your keys from your vehicles** - Don't leave keys in the ignition, on the seat or in the console. Many thefts are done just by people looking in the car window, seeing the keys and waiting for the right moment to strike.
3. **Lock your doors and windows** - While we would like to think that we live out in the country and that crime does not occur, that is not true. Many of the thefts from vehicles are again, crimes of opportunity. People walk by, see that your car doors are unlocked and just open the door, rummage through the glove box, console or find things on the seats to take. When you go on vacation or leave the house, lock your doors and windows. Locks are meant to keep honest people out and if someone wants to get in, they will, but why make it easier for them.
4. **Hide your stuff** - Don't leave valuable items out in the open, it is like a moth to a flame. When you leave expensive electronics, cash, jewelry and other "stuff" out and around, you can draw unwanted attention. Please take pictures of important/valuable items and note any identifying marks. Also please record all of the serial and model numbers and keep everything secured. If you become one of the unfortunate victims, you will be able to provide the police department with information that might help us help you.
5. **CALL THE POLICE** - If you suspect someone may have broken into your house or stolen something, or see something that is suspicious, regardless of the time of day, call the police department. We are on duty, 24 hours a day and will respond to your call even if you are not sure that something illegal was happening. We would rather get called and find out it was nothing, than not get called and find out it was something. All too often, we will find out about something 2 or 3 weeks after the offense because someone didn't want to bother us. Sometimes, with such a delay, we are not able to provide the level of service that we would like to because of that delay.

We hope that you enjoy the rest of your summer and again would like to remind people to be safe. If you have any questions, problems or want to report an incident, please contact the Belmont Police Department at 267-8350.

Town Clerk/Tax Collector

Here's an RSA that should be of interest to ALL RESIDENTS- Please read carefully as we are enforcing this in Belmont now due to a state audit.

There is an \$18.00 fee for a certified copy.

261:148 Permit Required. – No vehicle, except an OHRV, snowmobile or moped, owned or controlled by a resident of this state shall be registered under the provisions of this chapter until the owner or person controlling the same has obtained a permit for registration from the city or town wherein he resides. This section shall not apply to vehicles which constitute stock in trade of a manufacturer or of a bona fide dealer. The town or city clerk shall issue such permits to vehicles exempted from registration fees under RSA 261:92 at no charge. If the town or city has adopted the provisions of RSA 231:130-a, no such permit shall be issued unless the town or city clerk's records reveal no outstanding parking violations in this state. **No such permit shall be issued unless the owner or person controlling the vehicle presents to the town or city clerk:**

I. **A certificate of title** if required by the provisions of this chapter, or application for such certificate of title; or

II. In the case of a vehicle exempted from the title requirements of this chapter:

(a) **A bill of sale** from such previous owner; or

(b) If the previous owner was a dealer in vehicles, a temporary registration certificate.

III. The bill of sale required by the provisions of paragraph II shall contain the following information:

(a) The date of the sale;

(b) A description of the vehicle including:

(1) Make;

(2) Model;

(3) Vehicle identification number;

(4) Model year;

(5) Year of manufacture;


(6) Type of body; and

(7) Number of cylinders.

(c) Name and address of purchaser; and

(d) Signature and address of seller.

IV. **In the case of any vehicle, a certificate of registration to the same owner for a current or previous registration period.**




What this means for the general public in layman terms is if you come in to renew your registration and don't have a copy of your old registration you will be charged \$18.00 for a certified copy. This is a state law and we are mandated to uphold it. Please don't take the opportunity to air your frustrations to the Clerk's office staff. News from the Conservation Commission

Tioga River Trail Recently Conserved in Belmont!



Dick and Betty Persons of Gilford have recently, graciously donated to Belmont a 20 Ac± parcel of land, the former Belmont-Tilton Branch of the Boston, Concord and Montreal Railroad, to be conserved forever for the enjoyment of our residents. This parcel has significant historic, recreation and conservation value to the Town. The land was instrumental in Belmont's recent selection as a recipient of a Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) grant from the National Park Service to build a Pavilion and Riverwalk. Its value served as Belmont's match for the \$89,000 grant.



The LWCF Program provides matching grants to States and local governments for the acquisition and development of public outdoor recreation areas and facilities. The program is intended to create and maintain a nationwide legacy of high quality recreation areas and facilities and to stimulate non-federal investments in the protection and maintenance of recreation resources across the United States.

The Pavilion is anticipated to be a community gathering place for the Recreation Departments programs, a Farmers' Market, Old Home Day and the Schools. The Riverwalk is contemplated to connect to the existing informal walking trail on the donated railroad land by a footbridge located behind the Belmont Mill that will mimic an historic bridge in its original location.

The railroad property winds through mostly undeveloped landscape along the Tioga River and offers many natural vistas as one walks along. Currently, it is possible to walk to the Belmont Village from Great Brook Village. Shortly beyond GBV the Tioga River has washed out a culvert or bridge that will require replacement in order to get further west to South Road, Depot Street and beyond. This trail could eventually make it relatively easy to access the Franklin-Tilton-Northfield Rail Trail along Route 140.

Monthly Recipe

Ahhh the hot August days are upon us, for my family this means lots of time by the pool and getting together with friends. Of course that always involves food-so why not try something new? I think you'll find this salsa recipe delicious and a refreshing change from the norm. Enjoy!

Watermelon Salsa Recipe

Ingredients

- 2 cups seeded finely chopped watermelon
- 1/2 cup finely chopped peeled cucumber
- 1/4 cup finely chopped red onion
- 1/4 cup finely chopped sweet red pepper
- 1 jalapeno pepper, seeded and minced
- 1/4 cup minced fresh cilantro
- 1 tablespoon minced fresh basil
- 1 tablespoon minced fresh mint
- 2 tablespoons honey
- 1 teaspoon lime juice
- Baked tortilla chip scoops



Directions

- In a large bowl, combine the watermelon, cucumber, onion, peppers and herbs. Drizzle with honey and lime juice; gently toss to coat.
- Refrigerate for at least 1 hour. Serve with chips. Yield: 3 cups.

Note: We recommend wearing disposable gloves when cutting hot peppers. Avoid touching your face.

A friend recently made this pie for me and it was delicious and so easy. I hope you like it!

Lemonade Pie

- 1 Can Condensed Lemonade (do not thaw)
- ½ Large Container Cool Whip (thaw slightly)
- 1 Container Vanilla Bean Ice Cream (thaw slightly)
- 2 Graham Cracker Crusts

Mix all ingredients together pour into the two crusts, refreeze and top if desired with cool whip.
