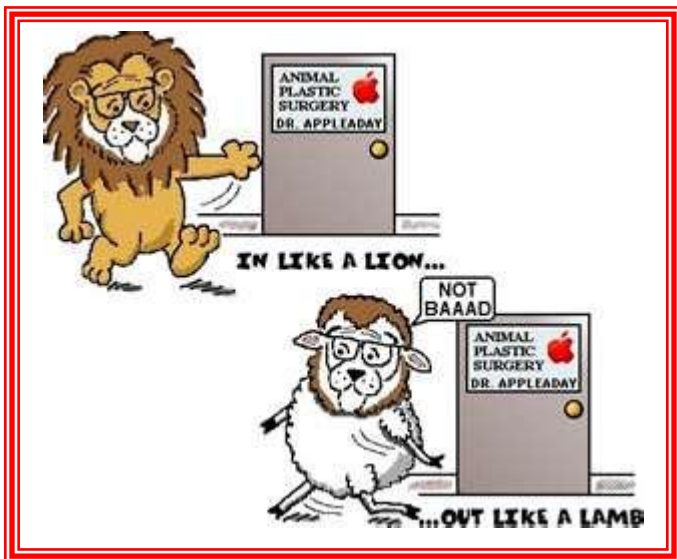

Parks & Recreation

Belmont Parks & Recreation enjoyed the winter at Gunstock on Sundays with 106 participants in our ski and board program, many of the kids and adults wanted more so we have added 3 more Sundays in March. The Outreach program is an affordable way for children to try out skiing or boarding or for your family to spend the day on the slopes together. Winter just seems to fly by when we spend our Sunday's outside enjoying the fresh air. School vacation week Jim White's soccer clinic is taking place at the Belmont Elementary School for 3-7 year olds, with another clinic planned for April Vacation. In January and February we had a number of very popular adult

programs, Yoga, Zumba, and Boot Camp. Renee Boles is teaching another 4 week Boot Camp, Monday and Wednesday nights starting on March 5th and her very popular Zumba class for 6 weeks starting on March 8th. Joyce Kendall will instruct a new 6 week Yoga session starting on March 6th. Have you always wanted to try out a program without committing, we now offer a drop in fee for the Boot Camp, Zumba and Yoga classes, so drop in and see what you are missing or pay only for the classes you can attend. We have a 4 week Archery

Land Use News

Planning Board:

- Approval granted to LED Construction for an extension to a 4-lot subdivision on Sand Circle.
- Approval granted to EJ Pelletier and Glenice Fitzbag for a two lot subdivision on Durrell Mountain Road.

General Land Use:

- **Budget Year-End Accountability:** Each year the Planning and Zoning Boards develop their combined Land Use Budget based on several factors and continually apply cost-saving methods during the ensuing year to minimize overall expenses. As a result of these efforts, for the years 2006 to 2010 the Land Use budget returned to the General Fund an annual average of more than \$9,000 of unexpended budget funds. For 2011, anticipating a reduction in the number of new applications, the Boards reduced the operating budget appropriation request by 10%. At year-end over \$20,000 of unexpended budget funds were returned to the General Fund. For 2012, the Boards reduced their operating budget appropriation request by an additional 6%. The Boards remain committed to providing quality customer service in an effective, efficient and budget-conscious manner.
- **Business News** – A new feature has been added to the [Economic Development page](#). The page now features recent news articles on community businesses.
- **Elections** – The Planning Board has two 3-year seats on the March 13th ballot. Current member Claude Patten and former member William Rollins are running for the two seats. The Zoning Board also has two 3-year seats on the ballot. Current member Pleasant Oberhausen and current alternate member Mark Mastenbrook are running for the two seats.
- **Driveway Permits** – Spring is fast approaching and many property owners will make repairs or improvements to their existing driveways or construct new driveways during the upcoming months. If your property is located on a Town or State road, a driveway permit is required (from the Town or the State) to construct a new driveway or make any alterations to that portion of an existing driveway between the road and your property line. Alterations include grading, culvert repairs/installations, paving or repaving. Town roads requiring driveway permits include both Town-maintained and Class VI roads. Temporary permits for logging activity are also required. Driveway permits are not required for work on the private-property portion of the driveway; however such work may not result in runoff from your property into the road right-of-way or onto adjacent properties. Permits are also required for any change of property use; e.g. residential to commercial, one-family to two-family, etc. Lastly, Town Driveway permits are also required for some private roads if it was a condition of the subdivision approval.

Conversations in the Community

Talking with Tykie



Albert Akerstrom aka Tykie is known and loved by so many in this town. Don't know him? Well you my friend are in for a treat!

Tykie was born and raised in Belmont growing up on School Street, during his high school years he worked for Weeks Dairy delivering milk with Billy Chapman before school in the morning and during the summer. He also worked at the Clover Farm grocery store. Some may remember this was located where the Belmont Village Store is now and next door to the old IGA before that was torn down. Starting in 1963 he went to work for the Town of Belmont in the Highway Department but only for a year before he entered the Army. Completing his basic training at Fort Dix then continuing to Fort Belvoir to complete his Advanced Infantry Training he was shipped off to Alaska. Where he claims to have loved it, saying we sometimes had more snow here than in Anchorage; he completed his Army career in Fort Hood, Texas where it was just too darn hot!

Tykie came back to Belmont and took a position with the Laconia Fire Department in January of 1968 sometime during that time period he was given the nickname "Tykie" from a co-worker Deputy Robert Lumbr. He claims there is no meaning behind it just sort of came about but he's not sure how. He worked for Laconia until 1984 he did however volunteer as a Fire Fighter in Belmont from 1963 until he took over as Chief in 1984. Early on Laconia tried to steal him back but as he says he's a hometown boy.

He met and married his wife Sheila in 1973; they were blessed with four wonderful kids. Growing up the kids were all involved in 4-H starting with raising & showing sheep. Tykie says that 4-H kept the kids out of getting into trouble and helped them learn responsibility; it was a very good experience. He talks about traveling all over the New England states to show animals in the 4-H fairs. All the kids have remained relatively close to Belmont. Their son Stephen is a police officer for the Town of Belmont with two kids. He also raises, shows & sells piglets. Next is Bobby who has three kids and is a police officer for the Town of Loudon. Bobby is also involved in showing cattle and some can be found at Tykie and Sheila's home on Bryant Road. Their daughter Becky has two children and is the Assistant Manager at Gymboree in Tilton. Last but not least is Mark; he is a full time Fire Fighter/EMT in Merrimack and has one child. In case you lost count that's eight

grandkids and six of them are under three! Tykie says he has a ball with the kids who are frequently with him and Sheila. The twinkle in his eyes is very apparent when he talks about “sugaring them up and sending them home”! It’s been a great life he says.

Retiring as Chief for Belmont Fire Department in 2004 he still works as a call fireman. When asked about his years as a firefighter he said there were good years and bad. He particularly recalls a bad fire on Church Street that resulted in loss of life saying it was bitterly cold and he remembers the fire started when someone nailed into the wall and hit an electrical wire. He is especially proud of his accomplishment to bring the Fire Department to 24/7 status and the apparatus he was instrumental in bringing to the department. But he is equally dismayed about the closing of the Winnisquam Fire Station saying he feels it was a big step back. His concern is apparent when he discusses how the people on the other side of Belmont have a longer wait for service; especially in the winter when the roads are bad.

Tykie is a familiar face to many who attend the Old Home Day celebration as he is a big part of the “famous chicken bbq” put on by the Fire Department every year. So look for him this year he’ll be the one smiling, and telling jokes.

Fire Department

The Members of the Belmont Fire Department want to remind all residents and business of the importance of clearly displaying the 911 approved addresses on your residence or business. During an emergency response being able to quickly identify and locate the correct address can mean the difference between a positive and a negative outcome. The Town of Belmont 911 addressing ordinance states the following;

New and existing buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers, or approved building identification placed in a position to be plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting the property.

All street numbers displayed on primary buildings or property shall be at least three (3) inches in height. The size of numbers placed on mailboxes shall be in accordance with U.S. Postal Service requirements. All street numbers displayed on primary buildings on property shall be of a contrasting color to the means of support

Correctly displaying your building address will help your Fire and Police personnel when they are responding to your request for assistance. If you are unsure of the requirements please contact us and we will be happy to assist you.



WHEN IS ICE SAFE?

There really is no sure answer. In fact, ice is probably never 100 percent safe. You can’t judge the strength of ice just by its appearance, age, thickness, temperature or whether or not the ice is covered with snow. Strength is based on all these factors plus the depth of water under the ice, size of the water body, water chemistry and currents, the distribution of the load on the ice, and local climatic conditions.

There is a saying that will help you remember how to perform a water or ice rescue;

“Preach, Reach, Throw, Row, Go.”

PREACH- Shout to the victim to encourage them to fight to survive and reassure them that help is on the way.

REACH- If you can safely reach the victim from shore, extend an object such as a rope, ladder, or jumper cables to the victim. If the person starts to pull you in, release your grip on the object and start over.

THROW- Toss one end of a rope or something that will float to the victim. Have them tie the rope around themselves before they are too weakened by the cold to grasp it.

ROW- Find a light boat to push across the ice ahead of you. Push it to the edge of the hole, get into the boat and pull the victim in over the bow. It’s not a bad idea to attach some rope to the boat, so others can help pull you and the victim to safety.

GO- A non-professional shouldn’t go out on the ice to perform a rescue unless all other basic rescue techniques have been ruled out. Extend an object the victim can grasp. If they start to pull you in, release the object and start over.



A plastic bottle can be loaded with 50’ - 70’ of nylon rope, and kept ready on your snowmobile. To use, secure the free end of the line and throw the bottle to the victim.



Many items found on shore or in your car, such as jumper cables, a garden hose, some branches, or skis, can be thrown or extended to the victim.

Public Library

How to Read...

(an e-book, that is...)

Technology has overtaken us by leaps and bounds. In the last year, e-books have become increasingly popular and e-readers are commonplace. At the Library, we offer patrons the opportunity to borrow audio books electronically and also to borrow e-books. Both transactions can be done through our web page (www.belmontpubliclibrary.org) and New Hampshire Downloadable Books from the New Hampshire State Library



(<http://nh.lib.overdrive.com>). The Library, along with many other libraries in New Hampshire, pays a membership fee to belong to a consortium so that we can afford to offer this service. Already the statistics have shown that e-reader loans to Belmont residents have increased 90% in ONE YEAR!! Wow!!! For anyone who has difficulty with directions for borrowing for e-readers, or needing some quick, easy, step-by-step instructions for troubleshooting, here are some “cheat sheets” to guide you through the process. Call the Library (267-8331) or e-mail us from our web page if you need more help. Happy Reading!!

Cheat Sheet for Nook and Sony readers

1. Register your Nook with Barnes & Noble or download Sony Reader for your PC or Mac at <http://ebookstore.sony.com/download/>
2. Go to www.adobe.com to register for an Adobe ID, if you don't already have one. You will need this to authorize your computer with Adobe Digital Editions.
3. Go to the New Hampshire Downloadable Books homepage <http://nh.lib.overdrive.com>
4. Select New Users from the sidebar on the left. Choose Software Downloads.
5. Click on Get Adobe Digital Editions and download the software to your computer.
6. When ADE opens, pull down the menu at Library, and select Authorize Computer and enter your Adobe ID and password to complete ADE setup. Close ADE.
7. Back at the NHDB page, choose My Account.
8. Select Belmont Public Library and enter your card number plus the 4 digit prefix the Library staff will provide for you—you will be logged in.
9. Select Home.
10. Find a title you want to read and check it out—BE SURE YOU SELECT AND CHECK OUT THE EPUB VERSION.
11. Click on the Download button.
12. Your selected book will appear in your ADE library. (Sony users, see **Notes**). If ADE doesn't open automatically, open it. You'll see the cover of the book or the title, depending on how you've set up your display. Click on the icon in the upper left corner that looks like 3 books on a shelf to get to your Library view. Connect your eReader to your computer with a USB cable. When your device appears on the left side of the screen in the Library view, drag and drop your eBook over to the device. Your transfer will be complete.
13. To return a title before the 2-week expiration, go to your ADE Library view, select the book, and click on the button to the left of the title to see a menu. Select Return Borrowed Item. You will still need to delete the content from your reader using the instructions provided with your device. CAUTION: Wait at least 24 hours after checkout to return a book. Otherwise, you may get an error message that blocks further checkouts for 24 hours.

Cheat Sheet for Amazon Kindle

1. Create a personal account in Amazon if you don't have an existing account.
2. Register your Kindle at Amazon.
3. Go to the Library webpage: www.belmontpubliclibrary.org or New Hampshire Downloadable Books homepage <http://nh.lib.overdrive.com>.
4. Choose My Account.
5. Select Belmont Public Library and enter your card number & the 4 digit prefix that the Library staff will provide you with—you will be logged in.
6. Select Home.
7. Find a title you want to read and check it out—BE SURE YOU SELECT AND CHECK OUT THE KINDLE BOOK!
8. Click on the Get for Kindle button—you will be transferred to Amazon.com.
9. Your selected book will appear on the screen. Under Deliver to: choose your Wi-Fi Kindle, or pull down the list to download to the computer for transfer via USB cable if your Kindle doesn't have Wi-Fi or if no wireless service is currently available. Click on the Get Library Book button.



10. If you are downloading directly to your Wi-Fi, the transfer takes seconds. If downloading via USB cable, follow the instructions on the screen.

11. To return a title before the 2-week expiration, go to Manage Your Kindle, select the book, and choose Return This Book from the Action button. Return to the Action button if you want to delete the title from your library. You will still need to delete the content from your reader using the instructions provided with your Kindle.

Notes

Kindle 1st and 2nd generation and Kindle DX do not have Wi-Fi capability and need a USB cable to transfer. Library books cannot be transferred on Whispernet or 3G.

If you accidentally check out an ePub book or an audio book format, it will remain on your NHDB account until the checkout expires. The library cannot correct this.

There are Help screens on the NHDB site that answer many questions about how the service works in general, as well as with specific devices.

For additional Kindle help, go to the Kindle Support page at Amazon.com. Under Kindle Content, you'll find a link for the Public Library Books for Kindle program.

Town Administrator's
Monthly Report
March 2012

Town Meeting Ballot Voting will be held at the Belmont High School on Tuesday, March 13, 2012 from 7:00 am to 7:00 pm. Copies of the Voter's Guide are available at Town Hall, the Belmont Library, and on the Town's website at www.belmontnh.org.

The Revitalization Committee recently held its 2nd public meeting on plans for the downtown. Our engineer, Hoyle Tanner and Associates reviewed changes to the village plan since the 1st meeting held in December and outlined plans to hold a 3rd meeting in late March prior to putting the project out to bid. The Town has submitted two exciting grant applications since late January which we hope will assist with funding on the project. We learned just this week that the results of the TCSP grant should be available later this month and results of the CDBG grant will be available mid-April. We have a site visit with CDBG scheduled for Friday, March 2, 2012.

Engineering is ongoing and plans should be ready soon to go out to bid on the Sewer Pump Station Replacement program. Voters are asked to support a bond issue for this project at this year's Town Meeting; sewer user fees will offset the cost of the bond over a ten-year note.

The Town of Belmont is a member of the Lakes Region Cable Television Consortium which has

been meeting since early summer 2011 relative to our Cable TV Franchise Agreement with Metrocast which is due to expire in December 2013. We have been meeting monthly and Consortium minutes are available on the Town's website, www.belmontnh.org. As more information becomes available it will be posted to the site. Please send any comments regarding the renewal process to jbeaudin@belmontnh.org.

Kona Inn Banana Bread Compliments of Fannie Farmer Baking Book

Ingredients

- 2 1/2 c. flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. baking soda
- 1 c. vegetable shortening
- 2 c. sugar
- 2 c. mashed ripe banana (about 6 med. sized bananas)
- 4 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 c. chopped walnuts



Directions

Preheat oven to 350. Grease & flour loaf pan (9 x 5 x 3") I use a Bundt pan.

Stir & toss together flour, salt and baking soda. In a large bowl, mix shortening, sugar, mashed bananas, eggs, and walnuts. Add combined dry ingredients and stir just until the batter is thoroughly blended.

Pour into prepared pan and bake for about 65 to 70 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center of the bread comes out clean. Remove from oven, and let cool in the pan for about 5 minutes, then turn out onto rack to cool completely.

Ingredients

- 1-1/2 cups cold milk
- 1 package (3.9 ounces) instant chocolate pudding mix
- 2-3/4 cups whipped topping, divided
- 1 package (4.67 ounces) mint Andes candies, chopped, divided
- 1 chocolate crumb crust (9 inches)
- 1/4 teaspoon mint extract
- 2 drops green food coloring, optional



Directions

- In a small bowl, whisk milk and pudding mix for 2 minutes. Let stand for 2 minutes or until soft-set. Fold in 3/4 cup whipped topping. Fold in 3/4 cup candies. Spoon into crust.
- In another bowl, combine extract and remaining whipped topping; add food coloring if desired. Spread over pudding layer; sprinkle with remaining candies. Cover and refrigerate for 4 hours or until set. **Yield:** 8 servings.
